INSTRUCTIONS FOR PROPOSITION 65 WARNING SIGNS (Current as of Nov. 27, 2019)

(a) At all public entrances to the Venue:

1. The sign must say:

WARNING: Entering this area can expose you to chemicals known to the State of California to cause cancer and birth defects or other reproductive harm, including benzene, from diesel engine exhaust, pyrotechnics, or other sources. For more information go to www.P65Warnings.ca.gov.

- 2. The font size of the language of the sign must be 72 pt. 72 pt generally translates into 1 inch, but the sign-maker should set the font size for 72 pt.
- 3. The <u>warning symbol</u> must be yellow background and have the black exclamation point in the center.
- 4. The <u>warning symbol</u> shall be placed to the left of the text of the warning, in a size no smaller than the height of the word "**WARNING:**".
- 5. The word and colon symbol "WARNING:" must be in all capital letters and bold print, at least 72 pt font. Don't forget the colon after the word "WARNING"; the colon also must be bold print in 72 pt font to match the word "WARNING".
- 6. If you have signs for the Production at the Venue entrances in a language other than English, such as in Spanish, this warning sign must be in available in both English and Spanish (or other language). Basically, if you communicate to your customers about the Production or Venue in one or more languages in addition to English, you also need to provide Prop 65 warnings in all of those languages.

(b) Areas where buses are idling

1. The warning should read:

WARNING: Entering this area can expose you to chemicals known to the State of California to cause cancer and birth defects or other reproductive harm, including benzene, from bus exhaust or other sources. For more information go to www.P65Warnings.ca.gov.

2. The other requirements for warning signs used at the entrances to Venue, should be followed for the area where buses are idling.

(c) At all designated smoking areas:

- 1. The font of the warning must be no smaller than 22-point type and the entire warning must be enclosed in a thick-lined box.
- 2. The warning must be on a 8-1/2 by 11 inch sign.
- 3. The warning must be posted at <u>both</u> the entrance to the smoking area and within the smoking area.
- 4. There must be a warning sign as shown below and the word and colon symbol "WARNING:" in bold text, with the warning sign at <u>least as</u> big as word "WARNING:", which must be in 22-point font.

5. The text of the warning for the smoking area is as follows:

WARNING: Breathing the air in this smoking area can expose you to chemicals including tobacco smoke and nicotine, which are known to the State of California to cause cancer and birth defects or other reproductive harm. Do not stay in this area longer than necessary. For more information go to www.P65Warnings.ca.gov/smoking-areas.

(d) Products with diesel-fueled engines, such as generators

 Any product with diesel-fueled engines, such as generators and light poles with generators, should have the warning below on a label attached to the product and that is clearly visible to the person operating the product. This label must be on EVERY diesel-fueled product, regardless of where it is located on the grounds.

WARNING: Breathing diesel engine exhaust exposes you to chemicals known to the State of California to cause cancer and birth defects or other reproductive harm.

- Always start and operate the engine in a well-ventilated area.
- If in an enclosed area, vent the exhaust to the outside.
- Do not modify or tamper with the exhaust system.
- Do not idle the engine except as necessary.

2. Make sure that the label has not been worn off and all the text is visible.

(e) Other potential locations and types of Prop 65 warnings

- Evaluate whether the Production requires the use of an enclosed parking garage, and whether warnings are or should be provided.
- Evaluate whether consumer product labeling or other warnings should be provided for items provided to the public.
- Evaluate whether warnings should be provided for food or beverages (including alcohol) provided to the public.
